Annual Notice of Special Education Referral and Evaluation Procedures

Upon request, the School District of Pittsville is required to evaluate a child for eligibility for special education services. A request for evaluation is known as a referral. When the district receives a referral, the district will appoint an Individualized Education Program (IEP) team to determine if the child has a disability, and if the child needs special education services. The district locates, identifies, and evaluates all children with disabilities who are enrolled by their parents in private (including religious) schools, elementary schools and secondary schools located in the school district.

A physician, nurse, psychologist, social worker, or administrator of a social agency who reasonably believes a child brought to him or her for services is a child with a disability has a legal duty to refer the child, including a homeless child, to the school district in which the child resides. Before referring the child, the person making the referral must inform the child's parent that the referral will be made.

Others, including parents, who reasonably believe a child is a child with a disability, may also refer the child, including a homeless child, to the school district in which the child resides.

Referrals must be in writing and include the reason why the person believes the child is a child with a disability. A referral may be made by contacting Matthew Sherwood, Director of Student Services, at 715-884-2517, or by writing him at 5459 Elementary Avenue, Suite 2. Pittsville, WI 54466.

News from Our Food & Nutrition Service Department

Dear Families of Pittsville School District,

Pittsville School District will be hosting Summer School June 5 through June 29, 2023, Monday through Thursday each of these weeks. Our food service department will be sponsoring a summer food service meal program during this time. Every Monday through Thursday of June 5 through June 29, any child 18 years and younger can be provided a free breakfast and lunch served within the school. The child does not need to attend summer school to participate in this program, they only need to come to the Pittsville Elementary School food service area from 7:30 am to 8:30 am for breakfast and from 11:30 am to 12:30 pm for lunch each of these days they would like to enjoy a school meal. All meals will be consumed on site. No to-go meals provided, no pre-registration is required. The child does not need to be part of the Pittsville School District, please enter the building through the office and check in to the office before coming down for their meal. For the two and half years prior to the current school year we are ending, our school district, along with 99% of school districts across our country, had been using the USDA SSO waiver program to provide free meals for our students. These balances do not disappear even if a family begins to receive free and reduced rates and they will carry over to the next school year.

High School Principal's Message

If a random person from the 19th century were magically transported to our modern world and sent to high school, would it seem familiar? My guess is that they would be taken aback by the attire, technology, and some of the course offerings, but a fair amount of what we do in school would seem familiar to them. One institution of education that would certainly look familiar is our grading system. A time traveler would see the grades of A, B, C, D, and F and feel right at home. However, there are key differences happening underneath these marks which represent drastic changes from the early Industrial Age from whence they came.

Grades are feedback. They are not rewards. They should not be used to sort students. They certainly should not be used to punish or reward students. They are useful for telling students how well they did on a learning task. And they are only useful in that area based on how clear the reason behind the grade is. At PHS we worked hard last year to make these grades more clear and more representative of a student's actual achievement. We wanted to avoid grades where low achievement was masked by strong participation and good behavior (students who do not demonstrate learning but are very nice and hardworking). We also wanted to avoid discouraging students who do demonstrate learning, but don't play the game of school very well (ace the test, but grade is low because of incomplete worksheets they may not have needed in the first place). With this goal in mind, we formally eliminated extra credit, raised the limit for how much practice could count in the final grade (30%), eliminated graded group work, and encouraged retakes on failed tests. Those were the moves we made last year to make our grades work better as feedback.

The next steps are in progress. We worked hard during our Early Release time this year to determine what exactly each student is to learn in each course in our district. This is not as easy as you might think. The state publishes dozens of standards for each content area; we have to choose which ones to focus on. Additionally, our school is judged based on the ACT exam, so we have to make sure we teach the standards that prepare students for success on that. Finally, we have to be reflective on which standards actually prepare students for success in life. Once we have made all of these decisions as a staff, we have to make sure our exams and assignments are tied to those standards. This is the work we have before us next year. Our goal is to determine what proficiency means in every grade, every subject next year and make sure we grade accordingly. This is far different than assigning grades based on points without a clear overall goal.

We would want our 19th century time traveler to feel at home with the parts of her world that made the most sense, but there's no reason to hold onto the pieces that serve no purpose. She would be amazed by our technology, perplexed by our food choices, and probably initially comforted by the old reliable grades. However, a closer look would reveal that PHS is now basing these old grading units on reliable standards and systems. That is a lot of progress!

The 2022-2023 school year was another successful year in the books for the students at Pittsville High School, especially the senior class. They will be graduating a class of 43 students on Saturday. But before then, please attend their recognition program on Wednesday, May 24th at 7:00 p.m. in the district auditorium. Twenty seniors are receiving over 59 individual scholarships and numerous awards. A true congratulations to the class of 2023!

In addition to the celebrations of the class of 2023, there were countless other recognitions.

- Over the school year, there were four Advanced Placement (AP) classes taught. From these courses, there were 23 tests taken all together. These students decided to challenge themselves and test their knowledge and perseverance. This is awesome!
- Another notable achievement were the six sophomore students who took initiative to build their leadership skills through the Wood County Teen Leadership program. These students attended nine leadership-training sessions at various locations throughout the county. We are proud of their efforts, especially the food drive they put together!

PHS Language Department

This year, the language department has been working hard to improve student writing, both as individual teachers and as a horizontal and vertical PLC. Looking at past standardized test data led the department to the conclusion that writing was a weaker spot for the high school students and led to many discussions about how to better teach and measure writing.

Aligning the work with the district ACT goal was the first step that the department took. Breaking down the measurements the ACT looks at led to choosing a specific writing standard to look at, and the creation of a common rubric that can be used across all high school English classes.

The department then took this work to the Grade 4-12 ELA team, so that collectively they could make a series of rubrics that scaffold students' writing skills and help them grow. This work, plus the individual work done in classrooms with instruction and student conferences, led to growth in each area of the ACT writing assessment from last year to this year. The department is already looking ahead to next year to implement the rubrics and writing instruction further, and continue to help students' writing improve.

Global Scholars ~ Mrs. Madden

Emma Kurtzweil and Lilyanna Rees earned Global Scholars Certificates from the Department of Public Instruction. These students have worked hard over the past four years to earn the certificate by taking globally minded courses, participating in cultural learning activities, and designing a service project to impact a global cause. Emma and Lily focused their efforts on sustainable water development, and went into elementary and high school classrooms to talk about the importance of having access to clean water. With community support, they raised over \$500, which they sent to Compassion in Action, a non-profit, who will use the funds to dig wells in rural communities in Honduras.

The UWSP holds a series of three math contests every year. The competition has three categories: Geometry, Algebra, and Advanced. There are four school size divisions and Pittsville is in school size three. A total of 45 schools participated this year with twelve schools in school size 3. Each school brought their top math students to compete in the competition. After three contests, Pittsville finished in 15th place out of all 45 teams and 5th place out of the 12 in our school size.

News from the Nurse's Office

On March 9, 2023, the Wisconsin Legislature's Joint Committee for Review of Administrative Rules voted to suspend some of the recently added changes to Wisconsin's administrative code (Wis. Admin. Code ch. DHS 144) that pertained to school and child care immunization requirements. The changes were originally published in late January, and were effective as of February 1, 2023.

Requirements for polio, hepatitis B, MMR (measles, mumps, rubella), DTaP/DT/TD (diphtheria, tetanus, pertussis) that were in effect before January 2023 **have not changed**.

THE CHANGES IMPACTED BY THE SUSPENSION INCLUDED:

REPORT OF VARICELLA DISEASE

Suspended rule: A physician, physician assistant, or an advanced practice nurse prescriber must document a reliable history of varicella disease by indicating on the department's student immunization record form that the student has had varicella disease.

Current rule: Parental report of varicella disease is acceptable.

SUBSTANTIAL OUTBREAK DEFINITION

Suspended rule: Updating the definitions of "substantial outbreak" to add chickenpox and meningococcal disease to the definitions.

Current rule: The diseases still included in the substantial outbreak definition are measles, mumps, rubella, polio, pertussis, diphtheria, and haemophilus influenzae type b.

MenACWY CONTAINING VACCINE REQUIREMENT

Suspended rule: Adding MenACWY containing vaccine to the requirements for students entering seventh grade, and a booster dose for eligible students entering 12th grade.

Current rule: MenACWY containing vaccine is not required for school entry.

THE CHANGES NOT IMPACTED BY THE SUSPENSION AND REMAIN IN EFFECT INCLUDED:

- Changing the grade the <u>Tdap</u> (tetanus, diphtheria, and acellular pertussis vaccine) is required from the start of sixth
 grade to the start of seventh grade; this change is to better align with the recommended age (age 11) at which children
 should receive the vaccine.
- Requiring schools to provide reports of vaccine compliance to DHS in addition to the previously existing requirement to report to local health departments.
- Removing outdated provisions relating to the 2008–2009 phase-in of Tdap and varicella vaccines.
