FROM THE DESK OF THE DISTRICT ADMINISTRATOR

Dear Parents and Community Members,

The third quarter of the school year always seems the longest, but it is always nice to end with spring in sight. We were pleased to have all of our athletic teams, concerts, and events run as scheduled with spectators! Empty Bowls finished up two weeks ago and was an enormous success. Almost all of the student created bowls were sold, we had plenty of delicious soups on hand, and the club will be able to donate \$3,000 toward our local food pantry. Our new art teacher, Maria Landgraf, held her first student art show the same evening of Empty Bowls and it was standing room only as parents, students, and family members viewed all of the amazing student work.

Our high school juniors took their ACT Test with writing in early March and the freshmen and sophomores will be completing their ACT Aspire and Forward testing very soon. The elementary school is in the Forward testing window now and will complete the required assessments in a few weeks. The state assessments provide data, but it is just a snapshot of what is being taught and learned over the period of an entire school year.

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Pittsville hosted the CWC Solo and Ensemble competition this late winter and several students put up state level performances in vocal and instrumental music. If you have been to our winter sporting events, you are aware of the big sounds coming from our pep band. Our music students have worked hard and grown a great deal in their craft and love of music. Pittsville is very fortunate to have such talented music teachers.

The CTE program is flourishing in the new learning spaces. Several regional employers have toured our facilities and learned about our State Awarded CTE Academy. The Academic and Career Planning in Pittsville School District continues to grow and evolve providing many opportunities for our students to have relevant engaging career exploration experiences in almost any field. The last two years, Pittsville has had twice as many requests from businesses for our senior capstone students than we have students to place. The last four years, we have had between 40% and 50% of our graduating seniors earn at least one industry recognized certification prior to graduation. With the expanded Agriculture lab spaces, there will be as many as seven additional Ag related certifications available in the future. It is an exciting time for our students as they are preparing for post high school options with more experiences than most high school students in the state.



In Pittsville, your kids are the most important part of all of our conversations. Your support and participation in your children's education provides the "extra" many children around our country do not get outside of school. Pittsville is a community school, we are honored and privileged to serve all of our students.

HIGH SCHOOL PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

The high school is working on a couple of major potential changes in order to better serve our students. We are considering revising our grading policies and working on freeing up more time for our teachers to collaborate. We believe both of these initiatives will help us to be more responsive and effective at educating our students at PHS.

We are taking a careful look at our grading practices. We want our grades to work as feedback to students. In order for that to happen, grades need to be accurate (do they reflect what students actually learned?), equitable (are all students given equal opportunity to earn good grades on tasks and

assessments?), and motivational (does our grading policy make students want to work hard and do their best?). Our perception, like many schools right now, is that our current grading system does not meet any of those marks. We are studying *Grading for Equity* by Joe Feldman in order to get a good understanding of current developments in the field. After this book study is over, we will form a committee to meet a few times to recommend some fixes for our grading system. It is possible that they will recommend some short term fixes to improve our grading system as it is, then recommend a longer term study to revamp the entire system. Some short term fixes could be not accepting zeros from students anymore, no allowed extra credit, and no individual grades for group work. Long term fixes, which would require a lot of study and careful consideration, would include swapping out our letter grade system for a system or scores based on content standards. We will make these recommendations based on teacher recommendations, but we will absolutely accept parent and student input as we study them. Revamping our grading policies is critical for improving our school forward.

We are also trying to free up time for teachers to collaborate. We use a Professional Learning Community (PLC) model in the Pittsville School District. This requires teachers to meet and collaborate on curricula, lessons, achievement, etc. Currently, teachers do not have enough time to do that. We currently extend the learning day for teachers by two hours about six times a year and dedicate an hour of that to PLCs. That is not sufficient. Excellent schools set aside at least an hour a week for teachers to have professional conversations. We are currently working on an Early Release plan for next school year where students would leave early on Wednesdays in order to free up this time for teachers to collaborate. If approved, most students would be released at 2:05 PM. Students who have been identified as needing more time to learn their material would be asked to stay and work with our paraprofessionals. The details are still being worked out and the Board will have input on the plan, but the need to free up time for teachers to collaborate is one that we are taking seriously.

There are a lot of great things happening at PHS right now. It is spring and the normal invigorating buzz of youth activity is apparent. As we progress through this exciting season, we are working behind the scenes to take PHS to the next level. It is hard work and often contentious, but our students are worth it!

ENGAGING IN ENGLISH ~ Ms. Hale

The English Department has been working creatively on how to engage students in the English classes we have to offer. Through several different activities, students have been able to dive deeper into what they are reading and writing which encourages them to think critically. For example, students have participated in hexagonal thinking where they focus on short story elements, poetic structure where they focus on breaking down poems to look at poetic structure, and universal topics where students look at popular topics across texts and create questions around them. Students in English have also been working on reading supplemental texts that help support novels they are reading. By looking at themes in poetry, short stories, articles, and novels, students are able to see how those universal themes extend across literature. These activities have helped students become more engaged in their reading which has led to students becoming more detail-oriented and thoughtful in their writing and reading responses.

GLOBAL SCHOLARS

This spring, Pittsville High School will be graduating our first two "Global Scholars!" Savanna Frederick and Ruth Durrant have earned the WI-DPI credential after much hard work. They took a variety of classes with global emphasis, read and reviewed works in which they learned about the global perspectives of others, and dedicated many hours in service of global causes. Both students currently tutor English Language Learners at the elementary school. They worked together earlier this year to organize the Pulseras sale, through which they raised \$1,105 which supported 18 months of schooling, 4 months of employment, or half a house for Nicaraguan artisans. The work they have completed for this credential has had an impact in our school and in the world. They will now go on to the next stage of their lives with the skills they need to be productive citizens in our global society.

JUMPSTART TO 2022-23 SCHOOL YEAR ~ Mr. Klein

Do your children tend to play too many video games in the summer? Do you have a hard time getting them to practice their math facts or pick up a book? Are you concerned about peer interactions and summer slide? If your answer is yes to these questions, then you should consider signing your child up for the Jumpstart programs being offered again this year.

Jumpstart is a more personalized time for students entering into grades 1st-8th to receive instruction in Reading, Math and Social Emotional Learning (SEL). This program gives students a boost going into the new school year. Jumpstart will run for 3 weeks: Monday through Friday, from July 25th through August 12th. This short class will offer an hour of math time and another hour split between reading and SEL.

The hour of math time your child will receive is a personalized math time to provide an opportunity to work on skills before school restarts. Lessons will be tailored to the needs of the students which will include some review of past skills and introduction of new skills. The reading time will be with a reading teacher devoted to strengthening oral reading, vocabulary, and comprehension with authentic stories and choice books. And during SEL, students will get the opportunity to work on life tools such as self-awareness, self-management, social awareness, relationship skills, and responsible decision making to improve their overall success in school.

If you want to get your 1st through 8th grade child's school year off to a great start, sign them up for Jumpstart (running July 25-August 12). Look for registration for this program in the Summer School information coming soon.

SENIORS:

Upcoming Important Dates:

Wednesday, May 25th at 7:00 PM will be *Senior Awards Night* in the auditorium. This night is a great opportunity to celebrate the Class of 2022 and their accomplishments.

Graduation will be held on Saturday, May 28th at 10:00 AM at PHS. Graduation practice will be on Friday May 27th, the last day of school. If seniors plan to walk for graduation, they must attend graduation practice.

Paying for School: Scholarships, Scholarships, Scholarships! As most of you know, most local scholarships are due Thursday, April 14th. For more information, check out the Scholarship Tab (specifically 2021-2022 Scholarships and Contests) under High School Counseling on the PHS Home page. Also, please remember to complete your **FAFSA** before the priority date for your college; your 2021 taxes will be used for applying. Applications are available online at: <u>http://www.fafsa.ed.gov/</u> (There is also a link off the HS Counseling website.)

Next Steps for Post-Secondary: Seniors attending a UW next fall are asked to take placement tests to determine what classes they should be placed in. Students should check with their institution on placement testing and can register online at http://testing.wisc.edu/centerpages/regionaltesting.html. (There is also a link off the HS Counseling website under the "University of Wisconsin Information" tab.) Additionally, most schools require a housing deposit of some form this spring yet to secure a spot in the dorms; please make sure you have completed this step to guarantee yourself a spot with university housing next fall.

JUNIORS:

Spring Campus Visits: Spring is great time for juniors to visit prospective campuses to get the "real feel" for campus life with classes still in session. Many colleges provide students and parents the opportunity to experience this together through their *Preview Days* programs.

Summer/Early Fall ACT Dates and Registration Deadlines: Students can register online at <u>www.actstudent.org</u> (there is also a link off the HS Counseling website under the "Testing" tab).

Apply Early: Students who plan to attend *Mid-State Technical College* after graduating can apply as early as 2nd semester of their junior year. This is a very smart thing to do as some programs fill up quickly (WELDING, NURSING, etc.) and applying early decreases the chance of being put on a wait list.

SOPHOMORE and FRESHMEN:

Sophomores have been completed their grade level meetings. Be sure to touch base with them to see what they discussed. The 40 minute meetings are very beneficial both academically and personally. They have a shared document in which to refer for all topics discussed. Sophomore students are encouraged to get involved in extra-curricular activities so as to help them and the community they live in! Also, the sophomore class had an opportunity to attend Career View day through MSTC on Friday, February 4th. Students in the sophomore class will take the Social Studies Forward Exam at the end of March and then the ASPIRE Exam the week before spring break.

All freshmen are asked to meet with Mrs. Krystowiak to discuss current high school goals and future plans. During these meetings, students are also <u>encouraged to look for ways to volunteer</u> in their free time and over the summer to begin building a strong scholarship résumé. Students are reminded to continue their career and post-secondary exploration and planning by using their Xello account. Freshmen meetings will begin the first week of the term 4. Students in the freshmen class will take the ASPIRE Exam the week before spring break.

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WATER POWER, WATER WHEEL Written by 5th Grade Students: Harper Abel, Esdon Sersch, Dulcina Aal-daood

The 5th graders worked on a water wheel project last week to learn about energy in science class with Mr. Schultz. This water wheel project was a project that taught the students how potential and kinetic energy works. Potential energy is the energy an object has depending on its condition or position. Kinetic energy is the energy of motion. By making a water wheel, it shows these two types of energies.

Some of the materials that the students used were two styrofoam plates, masking tape, and wooden sticks to put the two plates on. A piece of string was placed at the bottom of the wood along with a paperclip to do work.



They poured water on top to time how many seconds it took for the string to wrap up on the wooden stick. While it went up, the students reflected on what they can do better to make the string wrap up quicker. The higher the students poured the water, the more kinetic energy it had.

This water wheel project was super fun and the students even got a little wet. This project taught the students about potential and kinetic energy, and how to make something even better than what it was.

6TH GRADE ~Mr. Schiltz

In Math over the past quarter, 6th grade students have been further developing their understanding of fractions and fraction arithmetic. More specifically, students have been learning strategies that will help them divide fractions accurately while also being able to relate fraction division to real world concepts. After working hard to better understand fractions, students were introduced to decimal arithmetic. Students learned the importance of lining up decimal points when adding and subtracting decimals and they also learned how to figure out where decimal points should be placed in the solution of a multiplication or division problem. Mrs. Knutson and I are very pleased with the progress made by 6th grade students during 3rd quarter and look forward to what lies ahead!

7TH GRADE NEWS ~Mrs. Gawlik

This quarter in reading and writing, the seventh graders learned how to investigate how an author's craft impacts a reader's perspective and how to investigate characters on a deeper level, including their relationships within the book. In addition to studying relationships among characters in books, the seventh graders analyzed what it means to positively contribute to their own relationships among those around them.

To showcase their learning, they created a Book Poster to showcase one of their book's story elements and personal connections to the book.

8TH GRADE NEWS ~Mrs. Knutson

Eighth grade Inspire students created a board game or card game for other students within our school district. Students chose a learning target and created a game to work on that learning target. Students began this project by choosing the learning target, brainstorming a rough draft, and creating a visually pleasing game with clear instructions. Once they felt they were complete, other students played the game and gave peer reviews-checking to be sure the directions were clear and expectations were met. Students went over their peer reviews and made improvements before having a new group of peers give a second review. Students are in the process of making final adjustments before delivering these games to appropriate grade levels.

Eighth grade students have also been working on scheduling classes at the high school. The mix of excitement and nervousness about becoming a freshman is settling in. Families were able to attend the informational night at the high school and are having planning conferences with Mrs. Marissa Petersen to be sure they are prepared for the transition to high school. Promotion will be held on Thursday, May 26th at 6:00 p.m. and an after assembly event will be held at 7:00 p.m.

MENTAL HEALTH GRANT UPDATE

The Pittsville School District is administering The Behavioral & Emotional Screening System (BASC) for students 4K through 12th grade this month. The BASC was administered to students in the fall and we will use the previously collected data and the data from the spring administration to help set goals for the School Counseling Program in our district based on the needs of the students.

Parents and guardians are encouraged to complete the screener as it helps us to have a more well-rounded picture of how the student is doing. In grades 4K-2, the screener is completed by the classroom teacher, and in grades 3-12, the screener is completed by the student. A future goal is to have a classroom teacher complete the screener for students in grades 3-12. A version for students in 4K-2 to complete the screener is not available.

- Ind graders have been exploring the instrument families and how the instruments are grouped into different categories.
- 3rd graders spent a lot of time practicing writing in counting and performing rhythmic patterns during the third quarter. They have also just started learning their line and space notes on the staff.
- 4th graders continued to work on their recorder, but most recently started working on a recorder composition project, where they are writing a 10-measure piece to play on their recorders.
- 6th grade general music has been exploring the topic of composers throughout all the eras of history. They ended this unit by creating skits about a chosen composer and tying in a moral. Towards the end of the quarter, they began to work on the importance of music in our media and have begun composing music for their own news report!

They prepared three pieces and performed for Dr. McGinley, Associate Professor of Music (choral) at UW-Eau Claire. After their performance, they did a little 20-minute workshop with Dr. McGinley.
